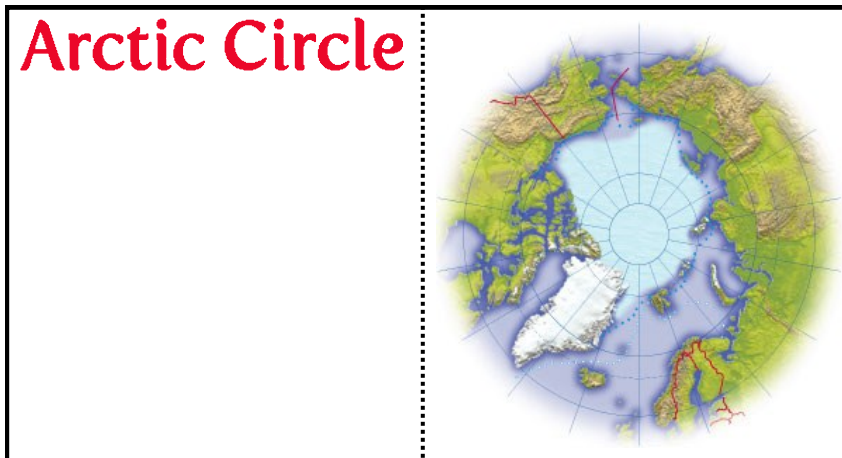


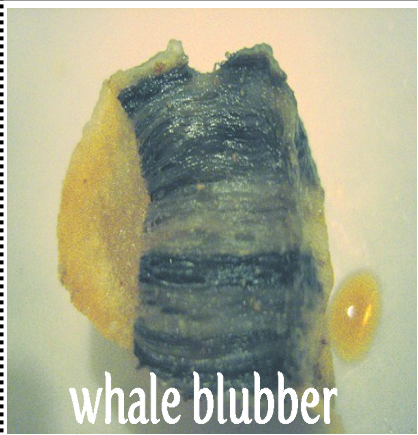

Match vocabulary definition pages to word and glue definitions under word.

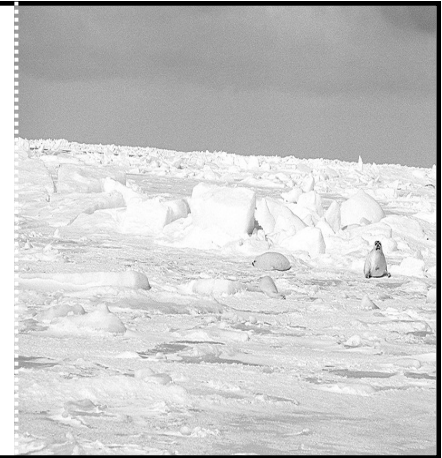
Fold in half but fold *back* and not in. So picture will be on one side and definition on the other side. Memorize, learn and store in pocket.

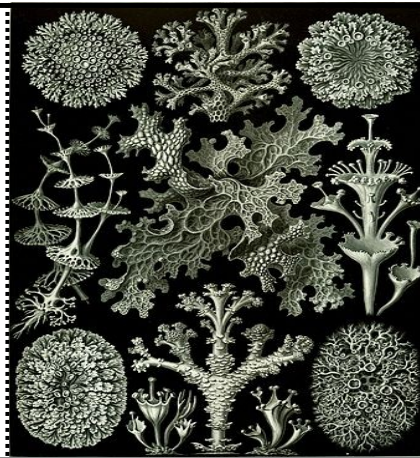

Arctic bumblebee

An insulating layer of fat just below the skin of most marine mammals.



The imaginary line that encircles the globe at 66° 33" north latitude. Arctic lands and oceans lie within this circle. "Arctic" comes from the Greek word *arktos*, meaning bear.



A treeless area between the ice cap and tree line of arctic regions, with a permanently frozen subsoil.



A flat expanse of floating ice.



A form of Native American art that uses animal bones and ivory. Artists carve pictures into the bones and ivory, then stain the surface to highlight etchings.



Permanently frozen soil found only in very high latitudes.



Pronounced IHN yoo iht are a people who live in and near the Arctic. Their homeland stretches from the northeastern tip of Russia across Alaska and northern Canada to Greenland. Many Inuit live farther north than any other people.



Lichens are organisms that are made up of two coexisting organisms, each helping the other to survive.



Insects survive winter by going into a dormant state. In this state, they can live despite nearly being frozen, due to naturally occurring antifreeze-like compounds in their bodies.
