To pass on their history and beliefs to their children, most Native American tribes told stories. They did not use or have a written language.

A Cherokee named Sequoyah thought a written language would be useful for his people.

He invented the Cherokee alphabet. He worked for 12 years to invent it and he completed the alphabet by 1820.

Soon the Cherokee began publishing it's own newspaper.
